So how can we express our passions through writing? Ask the students! What do you want to learn about? How can you share your passion through the written word? Students will be engaged, passionate, and thorough in their work. Rejuvenation for us teachers comes when we see our students actively engaged and learning.

Don't forget, when the school year ends, you have many successes to celebrate. You have made a difference in the lives of your students--it sounds so cliché, but it is true. It is not the lessons the students will remember, but how you made the students feel about themselves they will remember. Love yourself and take time to appreciate the wonder of teaching.
